PUBLICATION ETHICS POLICY

AJHS is committed to maintaining the highest standards of publication ethics and promoting ethical research practices. We strongly urge journal editors to adhere to the COPE Code of Conduct for Journal Editors

OPEN ACCESS POLICY

The Avicenna Journal of Health Science (AJHS) publishes fully open access journals, which means that all articles are available on the internet to all users immediately upon publication, without requiring a subscription to the journal. The journals are online first which allows authors, within a set deadline, to revise their posted article before printing. All the articles undergo double-blind and editorial peer-review and quality control. All the articles must be submitted through Open Journal System (OJS) and each of the authors or the main author is required to create their login at OJS of the AJHS website.

PRIVACY POLICY

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The AJHS maintains the policy of double-blind peer review for all publications with the anonymity of the identity of both the author and reviewer. The details that may reveal the author's identity are removed and kept unknown between the author and the reviewer. The reviewers' comments on the manuscript are kept confidential and feedback is provided to the author for improvement of the manuscript. It is ensured to provide the comments of reviewers to the authors promptly and provide them ample time to make changes.

The Editor is responsible to safeguard the privacy of the manuscript and remove the relevant information about the author and the contributors prior to sending the article for the double-blind peer review. The entire review process is kept nondiscriminatory and highly professional. The review procedures are conducted through a database i.e. Open Journal System (OJS).

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According to AJHS copyright policy, the copyright belongs to the Journal upon submission of the manuscript. Furthermore, it is considered unethical to simultaneously submit the same manuscript to multiple journals.

If the authors want to withdraw the manuscript during its processing, an email has to be sent notifying their intention. A final letter from the editorial office for withdrawal of the manuscript will be sent to confirm the withdrawal.

Please note that without a formal email of withdrawal, a manuscript is not considered withdrawn and use of such a manuscript elsewhere will be regarded as a breach of ethical conduct.

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The AJHS requires the complete authority of the authors to grant rights to their publication. Authors have to incorporate with AJHS that they can use any of their work into their publications and copies along with their name and identity.

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APPEAL POLICY

If the author holds the belief that the decision to decline the submission by either the editor or the reviewer was not in alignment with the policies and procedures of the journal, they have the option to appeal the decision. This can be done by presenting the editor with a comprehensive response addressing each point raised by the reviewer and editor. The editor will then reassess

the peer review process that was conducted for the submission. However, it should be noted that if the decision was made in accordance with the editorial criteria, the rejection will be considered final.

PLAGIARISM POLICY

The AJHS has a clearly defined plagiarism policy to promote ethical, original, and innovative research. The plagiarized manuscript has copy-pasted content from another research without crediting the source with proper references. This includes self-plagiarism, the author's own work published by their name already cannot be used without the consent of that journal and will need to be mentioned in the reference.

AJHS uses software named "Turnitin" for Similarity Check which is one of the most authentic tools to serve the purpose and promote original work. Manuscripts with a similarity index of more than 19% are not processed further unless rectified.

RETRACTION POLICY

AJHS follows the Retraction guidelines by COPE.

Retraction of a published article is considered on the following grounds:

- 1. If an article has gross errors in the results or the experimental miscalculations are detected after publication.
- 2. Plagiarism detected after publication
- 3. Redundant or Duplicate publication
- 4. Unethical Research results
- 5. Major Conflict of Interest

LICENSING TERMS

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ETHICAL APPROVAL OF RESEARCH

Every manuscript submitted to JPMA should have the ethical approval by the ethical review committee (ERC) or Institutional review board (IRB) of the organization. The statement should be written on the official letterhead of the ERC or IRB duly stamped and signed by the Chairperson of the committee. The study should be approved prospectively. Studies not involving direct contacts with human subjects would require submission of an exemption letter issued by the institutional ERC/IRB before the starting date of the project.

If an institution does not have an ethical review committee, the approval should be sought from another institution adhering to ethical norms and govern research involving humans by means of Ethical Review Committees that are willing to cooperate in the enhancement of ethical standards.

All case reports require an approval on the institutional letterhead from the head of the department. A statement should be included that participants gave informed consent before being included in the study or for publication of a case report.

GUIDELINES ON ETHICAL CONDUCT AND PUBLICATION OF HEALTH RESEARCH

Research Ethics

Research Involving Human Subjects

When reporting on research that involves human subjects, human material, human tissues, or human data, authors must declare that the investigations were carried out following the rules of the Declaration of Helsinki of 1975 (https://www.wma.net/what-we-do/medical-ethics/declaration-of-helsinki/), revised in 2013. According to point 23 of this declaration, an approval from the local institutional review board (IRB) or other appropriate ethics committee must be obtained before undertaking the research to confirm the study meets national and international guidelines. As a minimum, a statement including the project identification code, date of approval, and name of the ethics committee or institutional review board must be stated in Section 'Institutional Review Board Statement' of the article.

For non-interventional studies (e.g. surveys, questionnaires, social media research), all participants must be fully informed if the anonymity is assured, why the research is being conducted, how their data will be used and if there are any risks associated. As with all research involving humans, ethical approval from an appropriate ethics committee must be obtained prior to conducting the study. If ethical approval is not required, authors must either provide an exemption from the ethics committee or are encouraged to cite the local or national legislation that indicates ethics approval is not required for this type of study. Where a study has been granted exemption, the name of the ethics committee which provided this should be stated in Section 'Institutional Review Board Statement' with a full explanation regarding why ethical approval was not required.

Clinical trials registration

AJHS requires registration of clinical trials in national trials registry before undertaking the trial, as a condition of consideration for publication.

Funding

AJHS requires authors to state all sources of funding for their study.

Author's Competing Interest

Authors are advised to submit the declaration of conflict of interest by adding a statement at the end of their manuscript. They can add a statement that "The author (s) have no conflict of

interest regarding any of the activity performed by AJHS". If any of the authors have not attached the declaration statement at the end of their manuscript, it will be considered as "No Conflict of Interest" with Avicenna Journal of Health Sciences".

Authorship

AJHS follows the ICMJE recommendations on authorship credits, which aim to ensure that all and only those who have made material contribution to the research are named as authors. These require that all four of the following criteria be met to be considered an author: substantial contributions to the conception or design of the work; or the acquisition, analysis, or interpretation of data for the work; AND drafting the work or revising it critically for important intellectual content; AND final approval of the version to be published; AND agreement to be accountable for all aspects of the work in ensuring that questions related to the accuracy or integrity of any part of the work are appropriately investigated and resolved.

Every person who meets all four criteria should be identified as an author. Those who meet some, but not all, of these criteria should be included in an acknowledgement. It should be noted that data collection, laboratory testing, data management, acquisition of funds, provision of support for the study, etc. do not qualify (on their own) an individual for being included as an author.

Authors wishing to publish their papers in AJHS must abide to the following:

- Any facts that might be perceived as a possible conflict of interest of the author(s) must be disclosed in the paper prior to submission.
- Authors should accurately present their research findings and include an objective discussion of the significance of their findings.
- Data and methods used in the research need to be presented in sufficient detail in the paper, so that other researchers can replicate the work.
- Raw data should preferably be publicly deposited by the authors before submission of their manuscript. Authors need to at least have the raw data readily available for presentation to the referees and the editors of the journal, if requested. Authors need to

ensure appropriate measures are taken so that raw data is retained in full for a reasonable time after publication.

- Simultaneous submission of manuscripts to more than one journal is not tolerated.
- Plagiarism, data fabrication and image manipulation are not tolerated.
- Image files must not be manipulated or adjusted in any way that could lead to misinterpretation of the information provided by the original image.
